
He tells me the team lost the 1932 Army Cup Final 11-3 to the 1st Battalion Welsh Guards and the following year 19-8 to the 1st Battalion Duke of Wellington's Regiment. And also reached three semi-finals before the Second World War.

However with the war looming by the end of the decade, members of this formidable team were set to face more difficult challenges with distinction.

Tony Novis was to be awarded the Military Cross for bravery at the Battle of Sidi Barani, Egypt, in December 1941.

Douglas "Joe" Kendrew won the DSO and two bars, commanding The York and Lancaster Regiment in Tunisia and Italy in 1943-44, and later a third bar for actions in Korea in 1953.

Two of the team, Arthur Withington, 35, and George Anderson, 32, when Majors, were killed in action with The Leicestershire Regiment as Company Commanders in Tunisia in 1943 and Crete in 1941, respectively.

Col Goldschmidt, a member of The Royal Tigers Association, told me Watson, Withington and Anderson have memorial plaques in the Regimental Chapel, at Leicester Cathedral, and the families of "Joe" Kendrew and Tony Novis are planning to dedicate memorial plaques there on the next occasion when the Annual Regimental Service is held at the cathedral, which will be in June


